The former vice president may not have succeeded in winning his lady love, but future President Andrew Jackson had better luck, at least in his courting. After his marriage to Rachel Donelson Robards, the couple enjoyed a rustic honeymoon on the Natchez Trace, sharing a blanket under the stars. They were not alone; in those days safety dictated travel in large groups. Later, when one of the Jacksons' traveling companions testified to the shared blanket, what had protected the couple from robbers' pistols and Indian arrows would feed the fires of scandal after it was revealed that on that rustic honeymoon that Rachel had still been legally married to another man!

Today on the Natchez Trace, the scenery is very nearly as beautiful and unspoiled as it was in the Jacksons' day, and sharing a blanket under the stars is still a romantic possibility in any of the many campgrounds on and around the Trace. However, for those who prefer sleeping in the great indoors, lodging along the Trace offers a variety of welcoming options, everything from charming B&B's to four-star hotels with a wide range of choices in between. Dining along the Trace is equally varied and sumptuous.

Something old, something new—Ridgeland is also an antiquing paradise, with the largest antique mall in central Mississippi. And for couples who share a love for power shopping, the city offers an unbeatable variety of venues, from the indoor Northpark Mall, the state's largest, to the massive new outdoor lifestyle center, Renaissance at Colony Park, scheduled for opening at the end of 2007. Modeled after a European style village, Renaissance welcomes visitors with fountains, benches, outdoor cafes, and attractive green spaces.

This year, the innovative and exciting new Mississippi Museum of Art makes its debut with an exhibit of the art of Renaissance angels curated by the Director General of the Vatican Museum.

Not to be outdone, nature will also put on quite a show this year, as she does every year on the Natchez Trace. From the Spanish moss of Natchez to the gently rolling hills of Nashville, the Trace always welcomes with an ever-changing array of breath-taking vistas that open the way for a true engagement of the soul. Even a simple leisurely drive down the Trace is an experience to savor, an opportunity to recharge. Or, throw your cares to the wind on a sailboat on the Ross Barnett Reservoir.
